→ **Evidence-Based Decision-Making**

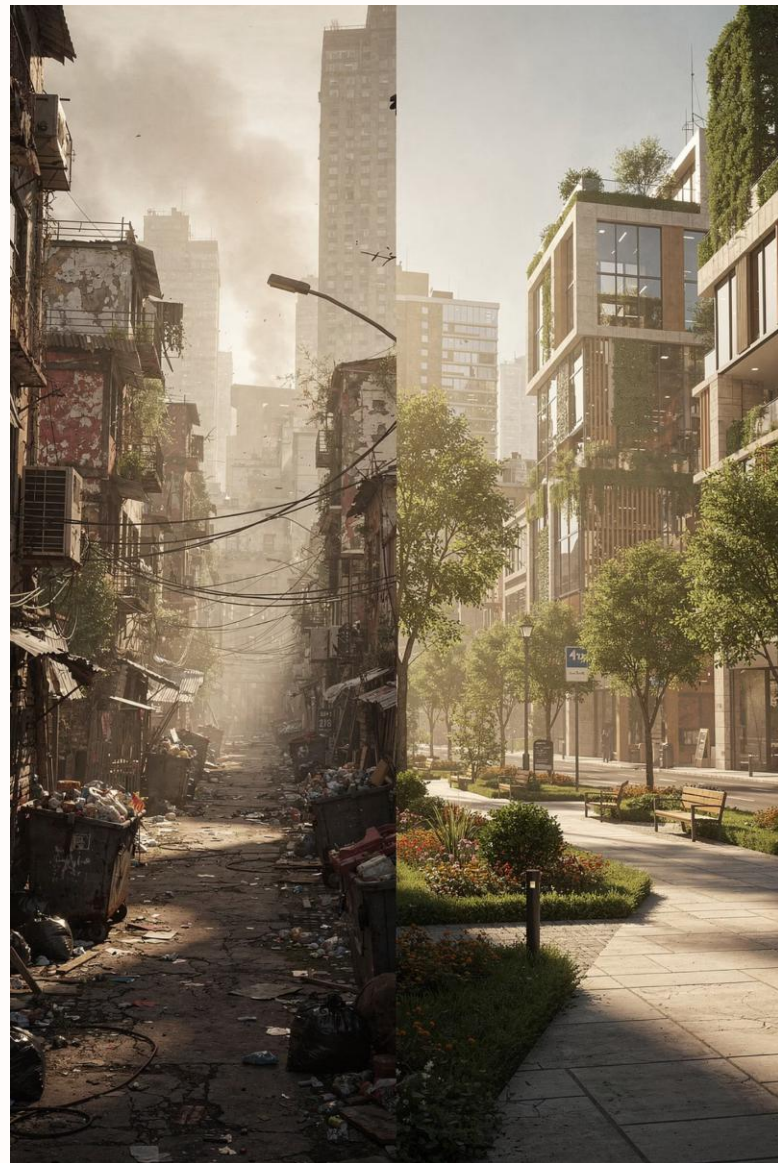
Policies are grounded in data, research, and measurable outcomes — not political convenience or short-term pressures.

From Unchecked Growth to Deliberate Planning

The intellectual and practical foundations of rational land use were laid by visionary thinkers and practitioners who recognized that land was too precious a resource to be left to chance.

Charles Miller (1894)

Introduced football to Brazil, symbolizing one of the earliest examples of organizing land specifically for recreation and community life — a precursor to dedicated public space planning.

Hans Bernhard (1918–1920)

A Swiss advocate who championed land utilization strategies to address supply shortages and promoted decentralization, recognizing that urban concentration without planning created social and economic fragility.

Armin Meili (1933)

Raised the issue of coordinated regional planning policy in Switzerland, arguing that land use decisions could not be made in isolation — they required cross-regional coordination and long-term vision.

Key Themes from COM(80)253

- Land as a finite and precious resource

The European Commission's landmark communication **COM(80)253 final** established rational land use as a cornerstone of Community Environment Policy. It articulated a clear and compelling argument: that land use, environmental health, and societal well-being are not separate issues — they are deeply and inextricably linked.

This communication set the stage for decades of integrated European planning policy, recognizing that sustainable development requires coherent frameworks that cross national boundaries and sector-specific thinking.

The UK's National Planning Policy Framework

Brownfield regeneration is one of the most powerful demonstrations of rational land use in action. Case Study: Rostov Region, Russia

The program aims to **eliminate irrational land use** by carefully weighing both economic productivity and environmental sensitivity in every land-management decision.

Assessment Parameters
